Paul's Message

Welcome to the latest edition of the Buderim Foundation newsletter, packed with items which chronicle the wide role the Foundation plays in our community. I'm sure you will enjoy reading it.



At this time of year our major focus is on grants. Applications have closed and the Grants committee is assessing which of the proposals best meet the selection criteria and also the needs of the community. It is not an easy task, and I thank Lisa Edward and her committee for all the work they put into it.

Another task for the Foundation is to determine how much money will be available for grants this year. To do this, we look at the earnings on the funds held in trust and determine the proportion needed to sustain the real value of those assets. The balance can then be distributed as grants. Last year we had some \$60,000 available and, despite the rather flat money market, we expect to have a comparable amount available this year.

Now is also the time, thanks to the generosity of David Edwards, for our Fine Wine Raffle. As in previous years, David has put together ten spectacular packages of wines drawn from his cellar. Two years ago we raised \$14,300, and I'm hopeful we can do even better this year.

Half of the raffle earnings are placed into the BWMCA sub-fund, where they are dedicated to benefit the Association, and the other half goes into our Open Trust. I should mention here that our new Youth sub-fund is growing well, and has reached 60% of the \$50,000 needed to begin its targeted grants program.

If you would like to support the Foundation with a gift on a regular monthly basis, we have joined up with the on-line organisation Give Now. You might like to look at the website www.givenow.com.au/buderimfoundation and see whether that is an arrangement which would suit your circumstances.

This is my final Newsletter column, as after well over six years as Chair of the Foundation Board I am standing down at the forthcoming AGM. It has been a wonderfully rewarding period for me, and I hope the Foundation too.

I wish Heinz Seeberg and Graham Tamblyn, who are taking over as Chair and Deputy Chair respectively, all the very best as they take the Foundation into its next phase of development.

Grants totaling \$277,745 have been awarded to 55 local community organisations in the last eight years. Well done Buderim!

Well done Lisa

In the lead up to the opening of the 2016 grant round, Lisa Edward and Grant committee members developed an Application Guide and revamped the Application form.

"This is the ninth consecutive year of Foundation grants so we felt a review of the process was timely," Lisa said. "We developed what we hoped was a user-friendly Guide. We then asked former grant applicants to review it and provide feedback. The Guide was then put on the Foundation website to be downloaded by interested organisations.

"This year individual grants of up to \$10,000 will be distributed from a total grant pool of \$60,000. Applications closed on 29 July and it's great to see how many of this year's submissions are from not-for-profit organisations that have not applied before. While we recognise the value of all the different causes and projects, the committee must make some difficult decisions and focus our resources on a few key areas where we think we can help make the biggest impact.

"I'm very impressed by the diversity of applications. There are many really innovative and interesting projects that span various age groups and target specific causes."

Successful applicants will be announced at the Foundation's 2016 annual Good News Sunday on 18 September.



A bit about Lisa

Lisa has a background in the field of health and developed a passion for philanthropy back in 1998 when she was awarded a Myer Foundation Community Services International Residency to work



with street children in Ho Chi Minh City, Viet Nam.

"This experience had such a positive impact on me, that for the next ten years I worked extensively in international development for non-government organisations World Vision and Marie Stopes International. I have visited community projects in Africa, the Middle East, Eastern Europe and Asia.

"I moved to Buderim with my family in 2013 and joined the Foundation. Being a Foundation Director is different to previous philanthropic work but managing the grants program is extremely satisfying.

Talented volunteers make the difference

Chartered accountant Allen Hertel, Director of Focus Professional Group (Focuspg), has been Treasurer of the Foundation since June 2012. Allen and his family came to Buderim in 1998 when he purchased the Chartered Accounting practice McCluskey & Associates based in Caloundra. In 2000 he moved the practice to Cotton Tree and changed the name to Focus Professional Group. With his current business partner, the company employs 14 staff to service their growing number of business clients.

"We totally support the concept of the Buderim Foundation," Allen said. "The idea of 'money in; money managed; money out' with no administration fees deducted is great. But the people who make it happen need support so giving my time as treasurer is a win/win situation. It helps

reduce the Foundation's administration costs and is one of our ways of giving back to the community".

According to Foundation Chair, Paul Clark, Allen's vears of experience in audit and taxation much appreciated and facilitates the smooth running of the Foundation's finances. especially in the lead up to the Annual General Meeting each year.



The year of youth

Chair of the Youth Committee, Heinz Seeberg, says the development this year of a Youth Sub-fund will allow Buderim philanthropists to specifically donate to youth activity in the Buderim area (4556 postcode).



"By the end of the financial year the Youth Sub-fund had grown to over \$30,000," Heinz said. "These funds will work towards the development of life skills' programs, as well as, meeting the challenges facing youth today... very real problems such as unemployment, homelessness and drug and alcohol issues."

This is the second sub-fund created by the Foundation. A sub-fund to support the BWMCA was developed in 2005.

The first Foundation breakfast was held in 2007 and over the years we've had a range of entertaining speakers... Dame Quentin Bryce, Allan Pease, Australian of the Year, Simon McKeon, Amanda Gore and Nambour born transplant surgeon Dr Kellee Slater.

In our '2016 Year of Youth' it was decided to take a different approach... have two breakfasts with the focus on youth from two different perspectives!

Breakfast 1 specifically focused on local Buderim youth activities, and involved presentations by Buderim State School's Chappy Dave, Sunny Kids' Chris Turner and Fusion's Jesse O'Neill. Those attending were impressed (and proud) of the local 'talent' (including MC Amber James) and reported that it was great to be made aware of what's going on in our own town in relation to the needs, expectations and aspirations of our own young people.

Breakfast 2 featured Young Australians of the Year, Nic Marchesi and Lucas Pachett, founders of Orange Sky Laundry. These two inspirational young men talked about how washing clothes for the homeless came about and how the service has grown from one van in Brisbane in 2014 to nine across Australia, including one on the Sunshine Coast, doing 6.1 tonnes of laundry every week.

But it's more than just doing the washing! It takes one hour to wash and dry someone's clothes and in that hour people, with no home or structure in their lives, have something to eat and a chat with friendly volunteers... over 1,300 hours of positive and genuine talk-time each week.

Nic and Lucas's presentation was cleverly done and included 'inspirational' washing on the Aussie Hill's Hoist, TV footage and large orange clothes pegs for those who asked insightful questions!

Approximately 120 people attended the two breakfasts at the Tavern which raised over \$2000.


Proceeds from the raffle at the second breakfast were donated to Orange Sky Laundry.




