Buderim Foundation hosts Bequest Seminar for Coast's legal fraternity

Around 35 members of the Coast's legal fraternity joined Foundation Members and directors at a seminar on June 14 to hear about the Buderim Foundation's role in building a stronger community through philanthropy. Presenters included His Honour, Judge John M Robertson, Foundation Grants Committee Chair, Lisa Edward, Carvosso and Winship Partner and former Foundation Chair, Gary Hopkins and Allen Hertel from Focus Chartered Accountants.

MC and former chair of the Foundation's Philanthropy Committee Swain Roberts said the purpose of the seminar was to engage with this important and influential audience and raise awareness of the Foundation across the community. He also said that with the Buderim Foundation now firmly established as Buderim's respected philanthropic organisation, there are many good reasons why making a bequest to the Foundation should figure in conversations about estate planning and people's legacy for the future.

Guests also heard that:

- Since launching in 2004, the Foundation has managed to roughly double the funds held in its two Trusts every three years. This balance now sits at just over \$1.4m
- September this year will see the 10th year of grants to community organisations that benefit the Buderim community taking the total to more than \$400,000 awarded to well in excess of 70 local organisations

- Additionally, the Foundation has facilitated the distribution of \$132,500 in Back to School vouchers to families requiring assistance. This program is managed by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) and is supported by our local Buderim Lions and Rotary Clubs
- And of course, there's the countless hours of time, talent and energy contributed by a small army of highly committed volunteers devoted to ensuring the Foundation continues to grow and achieve its goals

In memory of much loved Jeanne MacDonald lost to the 'Foundation Family' earlier this year.

Today, I finally found the phrase I had been looking for that captures the essence of Jeanne – 'Moral Compass'.

To me, the one outstanding trait that Jeanne displayed was her unflinching adherence to standards, otherwise known as a strong moral compass.

When I look back over her long life, I found it consistently there - which she acknowledged was due to the strong example her parents set and which enabled her to build resilience throughout her life experiences.

During her father, Senator John MacDonald's tenure, Jeanne secured a position in the Commonwealth Parliamentary Offices in Melbourne. Life was very patriarchal in those Menzies years and women needed to be strong to survive. And remember she was also a single mother at this time. Subsequently obtaining a position of authority at the Melbourne Stock Exchange, which was then a throwback to Victorian times, and to maintain it, was ability and character recognised years before the advent of 'feminism'. Corporate life would have been no easier at Coca-Cola Amatil. And, during the early 70's, it was almost unheard of for women to purchase real estate in their own names. What clever bank manager recognised her qualities?

I distinctly remember my first Buderim VIEW Club meeting in December 2002 when I had first moved here and Jeanne was Program Officer. As she delivered her set piece, I said to myself, 'that's a woman I would like to know'. It was only a few days later that we met one another informally on our morning walk and I was privileged to begin a deep friendship with her. Whenever there was a hint of my going soft, the authoritative word 'Standards' was uttered very firmly!

It is to the rare example of women such as Jeanne and the examples of ability and, more importantly, moral compass, that women such as myself could accomplish careers in the male-dominated world and for that I owe her an eternal debt of gratitude.

Vale, Jeanne, and deep thanks for the example and the memories.

Typical comments from participants: "I have made new friends", "I feel like I belong". "I love the hugs and the food", "I'm not the only one this has happened to", "I love my Youth Insearch family".

Sharyn says "We are also currently doing intensive program promotion on the Sunshine coast and are very excited to have recruited two new support adults to assist our young people at camp and help facilitate our weekly groups. In particular, the Foundation's grant allows us to support several extra disadvantaged youth living in the Buderim area."

Kindy garden project

Buderim Kindy was granted \$4000 to assist with establishing a 'Kindergarten Wintergarden' in a previously unusable area at the rear of the Kindy. This area receives beautiful winter sun and allows the children to engage with the environment, particularly during the cooler months. They wanted an area with a focus on edible gardening and sustainability with a natural organic feel sensitive to the leafy Buderim surrounds. The grant helped in the supply and installation on an automated watering system for their newly-established edibles, allowing the gardens to thrive in school holiday and weekend periods.

Important benefits include greater environmental awareness, less use of water, less packaged food consumption, lower 'food miles', and an increase in butterfly, bees and bird life.

The opening event on July 26 was a celebration of the hard work that went into building the garden. The morning tea featured some produce from the garden!



Buderim Male Choir

The Buderim Male Choir received a Foundation grant to purchase new sheet music as much of their music had faded and was difficult to read. The choir also found that many of the songs in the library were now out of date. It was important that the material chosen would be popular with their audiences. The Choir has been around for over 40 years and encourages men to sing and improve their health and mental wellbeing as well as providing concerts to the community, particularly seniors.

Buderim Rebels Hockey Club

The Buderim Rebels Hockey Club has used its Foundation grant to purchase a Hookin2Hockey School pack from Hockey Australia. This pack contains 30 sticks, balls and shin guards for kids aged 5-12 years which will be utilised at local schools in Buderim to introduce kids to hockey. The program has been developed to give children aged 5-12 a fun environment in which to learn the game of hockey and

perfect their skills in a modified game-based environment. Each child receives a Just Hockey starter pack at the beginning of the season which contains a junior stick, shin guards and ball. Currently the cost of this starter pack is paid for by the child's parents. The grant allows the club to reduce the entry level cost of hockey by providing the necessary equipment required at no cost to the child.

Sunny Kids

Some Buderim Mountain State School students received mentoring as part of a Sunny Kids sports mentoring program that delivered a lot more than just activity and fitness. The program was funded by a Buderim Foundation community grant.

Sunny Kids CEO Chris Turner said "This year, SunnyKids is delivering a Mentoring Through Sport Program at Buderim Mountain State School with the talented team, Bobby and Kristina Wilson from Awesome Wilson Boxing.

Dave Larkin, better known as Chappy Dave, has witnessed great outcomes for the 10 boys participating in the program. "As School Chaplain, I have seen the boys participating in the program looking forward to their Tuesday afternoons. They all get in, work hard, focus as a team and discipline themselves as individuals.

To see them test their strength, fitness and performance which then in turn increases their self-awareness and self-esteem is so valuable." Chappy Dave said.

University of Sunshine Coast Barbarians

The Barbarians received \$5000 to purchase jerseys for the next 3-5 years of play. They are given out each season and have allowed the expanding membership of women and juniors to play and continue to pay reasonable fees. Their club membership has grown significantly and it is now the largest Rugby Union club on the Sunshine Coast. The grant has made it more accessible for students and families of juniors to join a sporting community.



Alzheimers Australia

People living with dementia in Buderim and surrounding areas were invited to join Adventure with Dementia,



launched on January 24th, where they have been able to participate in a range of fun and interactive activities.

This joint venture through Alzheimer's Australia (Qld) and Bromilow Home Support Services, funded by the Buderim Foundation, is the first of its kind on the Sunshine Coast with a particular focus on younger people under the age of 65, as well as those who are over 65, yet fit and active and wanting to have some fun. The program is creating new friendships and enjoyment and is a great way to stay connected with the local community.

A big thankyou to Bromilow Home Support Services (102 Burnett Street Buderim) as they organise all of the outings, transport group members to and from the events and provide the carer/s to support the group during the events, ably supported by two outstanding volunteers who support the group members - Stacey and Denise.

Hear and Say

Over the past two years, a total of \$11,000 in Buderim Foundation grants has allowed more than 600 students to be screened as



part of the Hear and Say's School Hearing Screening program across the Buderim region. Foundation Director and Chair of the Foundation's Grants Committee Lisa Edward said "the program is greatly benefiting the community by increasing children's learning opportunities and drawing attention to the impact of mild hearing loss for children at such young ages. It's very pleasing to see the community grants we provide leading to such great outcomes."
