Around 100 Foundation Ambassadors enjoyed the first Happy Hour of the year held at Buderim Craft Cottage on 6 March. The crowd gathered in the outdoor area at the entrance to the Atrium and it was evident that, for many people, it was great to catch-up with Foundation friends.

Craft Cottage is inspiring. It was established way back in 1967 by a small group of keen artists and craftspeople who initially met in private homes. As the organisation grew, they moved to Pioneer Cottage and then to a small cottage on Bart's land... now Buderim Village Park. In 1974 the first stage of the existing Craft Cottage was built.

Since 2010, the Foundation has assisted with three grants... \$4,000 in 2010 for the attractive Atrium street sign; \$1,633 for indoor/outdoor seating; and most recently, last year, \$3,000 for the renovation of the main workroom kitchen... which is much appreciated by over 300 Cottage members.

Fourth Annual Youth in Philanthropy Project

More than 30 students from the 4556 postcode came together on Friday 28 February for an afternoon of philanthropic discussion. Hosted by the Buderim Foundation, the Youth in Philanthropy Project has returned for its fourth year.

Students and teachers came from Montessori International College, Matthew Flinders Anglican College, Sunshine Coast Grammar, Siena Catholic College, Mountain Creek State High School and Chancellor State College. Each school group came up with ideas for philanthropic projects which they discussed with their school guide about how it would benefit the community and used the Six Thinking Hats process to think critically about each project.

Once the students have decided on a project they can apply for one of the Buderim Foundation's Starter Youth Grants of up to \$200 to support the successful implementation of their project. Previous student projects have used the grants to buy resources to donate and others have used the funding to buy supplies to make more money.

The attendees were fortunate to have Brent Mickelberg MP come and speak to them about how important it is to make a proactive effort to give back in their local community and appreciate those who volunteer and work hard to make it a better place. Mr Mickelberg said that the people who volunteer and work with charities and not-for-profits are the fabric that ties our community together.

Dr Russell Stitz, Chair of the Buderim Foundation, spoke and informed the students about what the Buderim Foundation does and how the Youth in Philanthropy Project benefits the Buderim community. Dr Stitz said that to build a stronger community we need to be building a philanthropic culture.

Students were also lucky to have Lisa Rowe from Wishlist, a previous Buderim Foundation grant recipient, who spoke about what the not-for-profit does and how it supports health projects across the Sunshine Coast. She additionally spoke on becoming a Wishlist Ambassador and what that entails. The students were engaged and excited to be a part of growing their community and eager to develop their ideas.

\$11,000 in Back to School Vouchers helping local kids


The Buderim Foundation, with Rotary donations from Buderim Lions and Buderim Rotary is proud to have again participated in the Back to School Program administered by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR). This program is designed to provide timely and practical assistance to families in need in meeting essential school expenses such as uniforms, shoes and stationery.

The vouchers are provided in the form of Target gift cards each valued at \$50. Foundation Director Rebecca Ramsay advised that this year 220 cards were shared among Mountain Creek Primary School, Chancellor State Primary and High Schools, Buderim Mountain State School and Sunnykids. The Foundation extends its heartfelt thanks to our local Lions and Rotary Clubs for their continued generosity in supporting this most worthwhile initiative. Through participation in this program, in the past 16 years, Back to School vouchers to the total value of \$165,950 have been shared among local families. Mountain Creek State School Chaplain Anthony Pulford said he knew of many families doing it tough in our community and he felt privileged to be able to assist them. "The vouchers make a real difference, not just in practical terms but also knowing that their community cares and supports them. It's much more than just \$50.".
