A Christmas message from the Chair

It is a pleasure to welcome readers to this newsletter especially as it is my first as Chair of the Buderim Foundation Board. I would like to acknowledge and thank my predecessors from 2010-17, Paul Clark and Heinz Seeberg for their stellar performances as Chair, which ensured the stability and ongoing security of the Foundation.



2017 marked some significant events, including our first-ever daytime Community Grants Celebration and the success of the inaugural 'Lunch en Blanc'.

The Buderim Foundation is remarkable among community philanthropic organisations for its low-cost administration. The generous contribution of our three major sponsors, Buderim Pharmacy, Edenlea on Buderim and Sunshine Toyota, each of whom I sincerely thank on the Foundation's behalf, covers all administrative costs. Our six Members and 12 Directors, supported by some 290 Ambassadors, all offer their time and talents voluntarily.

By this means every dollar donated or bequeathed to the Foundation, or raised at its events is never spent, but rather placed in a fund and invested carefully. Income then generated is returned to the 4556 community via grants to community organisations.

From launch in 2004 to the present, the fund has grown to over \$1.4 million. Since the inaugural grants of 2008, 116 grants totalling \$383,857 have been awarded to 66 community organisations. Additionally more than \$35,700 has been provided for local Youth in Philanthropy programs overall and more than 2,500 school support vouchers to the value of \$125,000 have been distributed to families in need.

The Foundation's 2018 Community Challenge will serve to grow the fund even further and thereby increase the income available for community grants. Due to be launched in January, the Challenge promises to take the Foundation to the next level... watch this space.

A total of 17 community organisations serving the 4556 postcode were chosen from a record field of applicants to share in more than \$64,000 distributed as the Buderim Foundation's 2017 Community Grants. For the first time, the Grants Celebration was held as a daytime event on the lawn beside the BMWCA Hall in Main Street to underline the Foundation's emerging focus on youth in philanthropy.

Attended by over 200 under sunny skies, with entertainment provided by Buderim Mountain State School performing troupes, Hot Ginger Chorus, Coastal Caring Clowns and the Buderim Men's Choir, the event was an great success.

Suncoast Clippers

The Suncoast Clippers' received \$4,000 for the construction of an outdoor quarter basketball court, providing free of charge access to the public. This facility is designed to attract the growing street ball segment and encourage their engagement with formal basketball. It will also serve to build our community, by fostering confidence, fitness and inclusiveness among local youth.

The Clippers started in 1974 as the birthplace of Sunshine Coast basketball and now boasts some 576 members and 70 registered volunteers. Their aim is to provide a safe and nurturing environment for basketballers of all ages and skill levels. The Clippers have represented the Sunshine Coast community in local, state and national level competition.

Buderim Horse and Pony Club

Located at the Ballinger Park Sports Complex, the Buderim Horse and Pony Club has a history of community involvement and engagement in Buderim. Most of the Club's riders are aged under 20. The Club seeks to provide a safe environment for its young members to develop horsemanship skills, learn to care for their animals and develop the individual's personal qualities. The Club also contributes to the community by providing access to its facilities for other riding groups and for equestrian competition.

The Buderim Horse and Pony Club will put their 2017 grant of \$5,000 towards the cost of replacing fencing at its premises. These works will be of benefit to both the Club and other sporting organisations which use the Ballinger Park complex by enhancing safety and security for everyone.



Heinz Seeberg and his wife Sarah first visited Buderim in 1970 and were so impressed with the town that their long term plan was to become Buderim residents. Heinz retired from work in Switzerland in 2008, settled in Buderim and became a

Director of the Buderim Foundation in 2010. With over 40 years' management experience in international companies, Heinz brought valuable planning and team building skills to the Foundation. His first step was to join the Marketing Committee and in 2011 he led a 'ground up' revision of the Foundation's Strategic Plan.

Heinz took on the position of Chair of the Youth Committee when it was established later in 2011, and under his leadership the 'Schools in Philanthropy Programme' and the 'Youth Sub-Fund' were established.

When Paul Clark resigned in 2016, Heinz became Chair and the Foundation continued to grow under his steady influence. Heinz resigned when he and Sarah bought a property in Flaxton.

Heinz says his involvement with the Buderim Foundation has been an "immensely rewarding" experience.

"The simplicity of it appealed right from the beginning" he said. "I liked the "money in; money managed; money out" philosophy. And I wanted to give back to the community so it was the ideal position for me."

In actual fact it has been a 'win/win' situation. Heinz is a strategic thinker and a great listener... a team man, perfectly suited to the role of Director of a community foundation and he achieved a substantial body of work over the seven year period while with the Buderim Foundation.

Heinz promises to keep in touch and we hope he enjoys the second stage of his retirement doing the things he loves best – sailing, photography, travel, vintage cars and gardening.

Saluting John Devers

John Devers has recently stepped down from his position on the Buderim Foundation Board and as Chair of the Marketing committee. He has been actively involved with the Foundation from inception in 2004, right through until his retirement this year.



John's involvement from the outset of the Foundation has been to clearly communicate the Foundation's vision to the wider Buderim community with the purpose of raising awareness, donations and support for the Foundation. For 14 years he has been part of a team who have promoted the Foundation through clever marketing strategies and communication techniques. In 2013, John became a Director on the Buderim Foundation Board. His organisational and writing skills have been crucial to the success of the Foundation.

John has been the principal contact with our three sponsors and built and nurtured this relationship through his uniquely designed sponsor package. In addition, he helped develop the distinctive 'Ambassador Program' that has been a key component of the success of the Foundation.

John has a rare skill in volunteer management. He led an energized and passionate group that enjoyed his company and shared his passion for Buderim and philanthropy.

Together with his commitment to the Buderim Foundation, John recognised the value of the Buderim War Memorial Community Association (BWMCA) and the integral part the two organisations play in maintaining and growing the community spirit Buderim is renowned for.

In 2015, John coordinated a publication named the 'Spirit of Buderim'. It was a huge success promoting the importance of philanthropy to the 37,000 residents. Additionally John coordinated the marketing of Buderim's 150th celebrations (B150) in 2012.

John has given unconditionally to Buderim. His professionalism and passion, and long-term involvement has left the Foundation in a position to flourish. His contribution will be felt for many years to come not only in the Foundation but the community as a whole.

Buderim Identities to run in 2018 Commonwealth Games Baton Relay

Thirty-five years after former Foundation Director, Leanne Evans, won a silver medal in the 4x400m athletics relay at the 1982 Brisbane Commonwealth Games, she received news she was to carry the 2018 Commonwealth Games baton. In a twist of fate, one of Leanne's fellow relay team mates was none other than Foundation Ambassador and athletics superstar Raelene Boyle, who will also carry the baton on the Gold Coast just prior to the 2018 Opening Ceremony.

One of Leanne's proudest volunteering legacies across three continents and five countries was the establishment of the Buderim Foundation which grew from her throw-away question to another Ambassador Simon Whittle whilst buying postcards in the OPO. Simon took up Leanne's challenge and together with others, they set up a working group which oversaw a feasibility study to consider whether a foundation should be established in Buderim.

It is fitting that Leanne will carry the baton on the same day as Brent Crosby representing Team Adem, a Buderim Foundation grant recipient 17 years after that working group was set up.

You can see Leanne and Brent carry the baton in Caloundra on 27 March, 2018.
