Buderim Foundation Launches the 2018 Community Challenge

Welcome everyone to the Buderim Foundation's first newsletter for 2018, the Community Challenge edition. By now you have probably heard of our Buderim Foundation 2018 Community Challenge which was officially launched at the Buderim Australia Day Parade. The Community Challenge is a simple one – to raise the amount in the Foundation's Fund from its present \$1.4 million to \$2 million by the end of 2018.



Through our prudent but effective investment strategy, a fund of \$2 million will generate approximately \$100,000 of investment income which will be returned to the 4556 community via grants to eligible community organisations. Over the past ten years, the Foundation has made grants of almost \$400,000 to 66 community organisations, rising from a relatively modest \$13,000 in 2008 to almost \$64,000 last year.

The Buderim Foundation is distinctive among community philanthropic organisations in that its administrative costs are met entirely by our three longstanding and generous Sponsors – Buderim Pharmacy, Edenlea on Buderim and Sunshine Coast Toyota. In addition, our six Members, 12 Directors and 46 committee members, supported by some 290 Ambassadors, all provide their time and talents voluntarily.

Our central concept is Money In, Money Managed, Money Out. As you may know every donation or bequest made to the Buderim Foundation, however small or large is welcomed though never spent, rather it is added to the Fund in perpetuity. Only the investment income generated is distributed to 4556-area community organisations which qualify under the Foundation's Grants Program.

Our goal of \$2 million by the end of 2018 is ambitious but certainly achievable – but we are asking for your help. By further building the Foundation Fund, we can distribute more money to more community organisations, thereby assisting those groups to better meet their goals.

Accountants' Seminar

On 28 February, a presentation made to local accounting professionals at the Buderim Bowls Club highlighted the work of the Buderim Foundation. Those speaking on behalf of the Foundation focused on the Money In, Money Managed, Money Out concept, the Foundation's low cost structure and the remarkable success of the Foundation since its launch in 2004.

Similar sessions for legal and financial-planning professionals were held in late 2017.

The aim of these seminars is to ensure legal and financial practitioners are well placed to advise clients who may wish to leave a bequest to the Foundation in their Will... a bequest which would benefit a wide cross section of organisations in the greater Buderim area.

Those attending the February seminar said they were impressed by the fact that the Buderim Foundation is run mainly by volunteers and that almost \$400,000 has been distributed to 66 local organisations since Foundation grants began in 2008.

Youth Summit

Student leaders from six Sunshine Coast schools came together in early February for the second annual Buderim Foundation Youth Summit.

Youth Committee chair, Graham Tamblyn said the annual summit is part of the Foundation's Youth in Philanthropy Project which aims to promote life-long philanthropy among Sunshine Coast youth.

The students, aged between 10 and 16, from Matthew Flinders Anglican College, Chancellor State College, Buderim Mountain State School, Montessori International College, Sunshine Coast Grammar School and Kawana State School were asked to think of ideas for a philanthropic project and develop an action plan to take back to their school. Part of the work to be done back at school will include the preparation of a grant application for up to \$150 'seed' funding to help run the project.

Mr Tamblyn said the students would have four months to develop their project before presenting what they've achieved and its impact at the Foundation's Community Grants Celebration later in the year.

Back to School Vouchers

For the 14th consecutive year the Buderim Foundation has been part of the Back to School Program run by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR).

Chair of the Grants Committee, Lisa Edward said 229 Target vouchers, each worth \$50, have been distributed to local families this year to help with school expenses like clothing, shoes and stationery.

“FRRR provided vouchers worth \$8,950 but also offered to match dollar for dollar any funds we were able to raise,” Lisa said.

“The Buderim Lions and Rotary Clubs donated \$2,500 which FRRR matched guaranteeing the allocation of an additional 100 vouchers.

“We give the vouchers to local schools, and to SunnyKids, who distribute them to the families and children in the greatest need, ensuring the most benefit from the program, whilst maintaining the families’ privacy.

“This year, Chancellor State College, Buderim Mountain State School and Mountain Creek State School each received 68 vouchers, and 25 vouchers were given to SunnyKids to be distributed through their Najidah Domestic Violence Refuge supporting children at Kuluin Primary School.

In 14 years, thanks to the generous support of FRRR and the Buderim Lions and Rotary Clubs, the Buderim Foundation has been able to distribute \$143,950 worth of vouchers.
