Lynette Richardson (nee Foote)

The Foundation was very grateful to receive an unexpected beguest of \$10,000 from the will of Lynette Richardson, nee Foote, after her passing in June last year.

As a member of the Foote family, Lynette had strong connections within the Buderim community. Her daughter Margaret Marshall said that Lynette had always been actively involved with the Foote Sanctuary and other Buderim organisations.

Lynette was one of 50 Living honoured during Legends Buderim's B150 celebrations in 2012, acknowledging those who had been born or lived in the Buderim area since before 1945.

Lynette died peacefully at home at age 99. Her generous bequest leaves a lasting legacy.

A Message from our Chair

Welcome to the Spring issue of our Newsletter. I mentioned in the last newsletter that the Board and Members of the Foundation were developing a new Strategic Plan. This work has now been completed and a summary of the Plan will be available on the Foundation's website shortly. The



Plan will guide the Foundation's priorities over the next five years, with regular review and reporting on progress.

Our annual Community Grants round resulted in grants being awarded to 21 local organisations. A celebration was held on 10 September at the Buderim War Memorial Hall with the successful recipients being presented with their cheques. This is a major event in the Foundation's calendar and a wonderful way to recognise and celebrate the achievements of so many of our community organisations and the generosity of our donors.

Two significant grants have been made recently from the Foundation's Thompson Charitable Fund: \$100,000 to Gateway Care and \$65,800 to SunnyKids. Gateway Care received a small grant last year and SunnyKids has received a number of grants over the last few years. Both organisations do invaluable work supporting those in need in our communities. More information about both grants is outlined on p4.

To enable us to continue to make grants and help those in need, we must keep growing the bank balance. As the saying goes, "all donations gratefully received". THOMPSON FUND GRANTS

Gateway Care

Gateway Care is a Caloundra-based community organisation dedicated to providing food and other essentials to families in crisis or experiencing financial hardship. Gateway Care recently received a Thompson Charitable Fund Grant of \$100,000 for the purchase of food

The organisation spends approximately \$15,000 per week on food items for more than 2,000 families. Gateway Care Chair Lani Refiti said that the assistance provided is often the difference between survival and despair for vulnerable families. Food is purchased from local suppliers such as Queensland Wholesale Foods and Foodbank Qld, with around 50% of those purchases delivered freely to Sunshine Coast families in need.

As well as purchasing food, Gateway Care operates a Food Rescue Program, collecting unwanted food from local supermarkets to make available for discounted prices or freely at its Food Centre. Any food that is not sold or given away is redirected to local farmers for their stock, supporting Gateway Care's commitment to zero waste. As a result of this, approximately 40 tonnes of food per month is saved from landfill.

It's wonderful that an organisation as essential and valuable as Gateway Care has benefited from a Thompson Charitable Fund Grant.

SunnyKids

SunnyKids has been engaged in a combination of early intervention, crisis work and intensive family support on the Sunshine Coast for more than 20 years. SunnyKids CEO Kathleen Hope said "We seek to assist families and individuals in some of the worst situations imaginable. Last year, SunnyKids experienced more requests than ever before. We were able to help almost 2,500 vulnerable individuals within families."

SunnyKids recently received a grant of \$65,800 from the Thompson Charitable Fund. Kathleen said that the grant will be used to provide more immediate relief to alleviate economic and housing stresses experienced by

AusLiving Support

Aus Living Support is a wonderful example of how vision, initiative and community spirit can achieve amazing things. In 2018, four friends - Leanne and Ian Harrison and Dessi and Kent Roberts - decided to try to ease the challenge of homelessness on the Sunshine Coast. Their self-funded initiative resulted in the establishment of Aus Living Support. The charity's Rental Supplement Program is designed to help those at risk of homelessness. The program focuses on families or individuals who have been forced into rental or mortgage stress through no fault of their own, e.g. a death, serious illness, domestic violence or accident.

Co-founder and CEO lan Harrison explained that temporary rental or mortgage relief can provide families with the breathing space needed to get their lives back on track. They're able to stay in their own homes, close to family and friends, with no disruption to their children's schooling.

Aus Living Support received a Thompson Charitable Fund Grant of \$41,600 last year to provide funds for rental relief. Payments are made as supplements to rents or mortgages and paid directly to landlords or mortgagees, not to the clients themselves. Support is given for a period of up to six months, with regular assessments. The grant has allowed 79 people, including 53 dependent children, to stay in their existing homes. According to lan, most people need only about two months' help to get back on track, with no-one so far needing the full six month period.

Aus Living Support's Rental Supplement Program, with its focus on preventing homelessness rather than reacting to it, often when it's too late, is a model for effective, valuable community assistance.

Celebrating the Buderim Region

Two longstanding Buderim Foundation Ambassadors, Ross Eason and Alex Sweet, have worked together over the last four years to produce a remarkable book.

With 196 pages, over 290 images and maps combined with stories and facts, the book offers a unique insight into the precincts of the 4556 postcode: Buderim, Forest Glen, Kunda Park, Mons, Sippy Downs and Tanawha.

Reflecting their long-term commitment to Buderim, Ross and Alex have produced the book as a benefit to the community. The profit from the sale of each book sold prior to the 15 November will be donated jointly to the Buderim Foundation, BWMCA and Buderim Historical Society.

This year's Community Grants Celebration was a joyous afternoon highlighting Buderim's community spirit.

A record amount of \$97,942 was awarded in grants to 21 local community organisations whose work benefits the Buderim and 4556 region.

Foundation Chair Rod McKinnon welcomed grant recipients and guests, including Brent Mickelberg, State Member for Buderim, Mark Jamieson, Mayor of the Sunshine Coast Region and one of the Foundation's Sponsors, Alistair Cook.

Rod also acknowledged the importance of the Foundation's donors, committee members and other supporters before introducing the new Chair Elect of the Grants Committee, Linda Bolton. Both Rod and Linda acknowledged the leadership and valuable contribution of Rebecca Ramsay who has chaired the Grants Committee for the last five years. Linda explained the grants application and assessment process before introducing Marg Welshe to announce the successful recipients. Brent, Mark and Alistair then took turns to present the recipients with their cheques.

Guests enjoyed a delicious afternoon tea of scones, jam and cream generously donated by SG Bakery Buderim. Carina Frank's piano playing provided a beautiful background for the afternoon.

Since the first distribution of Community Grants in 2008, the Foundation has provided grants of \$829,767 to 97 local community organisations.

Decoration design and painting of the street library pack was done by Layla, the ten-year-old granddaughter of Parish Warden Jane Butterworth. The result has been a bright, happy street library adjacent to the bench seat that was set up by volunteers.

Since its launch and blessing by Bishop Jeremy Greaves at Easter, the street library has attracted passing pedestrians, school children and their parents. Jane said that the Church has been pleased with the response to the library and welcomes more visitors and book exchanges.

Buderim Male Choir

Established in 1974, the Buderim Male Choir is a nonauditioned community choir, open to men of all ages. It's the only choir on the Sunshine Coast singing in the classic Welsh style of four-part harmony. Although officially called the Buderim Male Choir, members come from all areas of the Sunshine Coast and new members are always welcome, regardless of background or musical experience.

The Choir received a Foundation Community Grant last year for a new keyboard to accompany the Choir at practice and performances. Carina Frank, the Choir's Accompanist, said that the new, larger keyboard has provided a better quality sound than the previous one and will be a real asset as the Choir works towards its 50th anniversary celebrations in 2024.

An exciting development for the Choir is about to take place. Barry Leigh, Choir Secretary/Treasurer, said that the Choir will be trialling an arrangement with the Buderim Men's Shed that would enable the Choir to retain its identity but operate as part of the Men's Shed and use its facilities for rehearsals. The arrangement is a good fit with the two groups having a common aim of providing opportunities to promote men's health and wellbeing. It's also a good example of community groups working together for the benefit of their own members as well as the broader community.


COMMUNITY SPIRIT
