This year marks the twentieth anniversary of the establishment of the Buderim Foundation. We celebrated with a special Birthday Happy Hour in April at the home of Judy Wild and Raelene Boyle, where our very first Happy Hour was held years

The Foundation Board recently approved a grant of \$33,000 from the Thompson Charitable Fund to Aus Living Support for the purchase of school uniforms, shoes and backpacks for primary and secondary school students of families in necessitous circumstances. This Nambour/ Maroochydore based organisation, which has previously received grants from the Foundation, does great work in helping individuals in need and we are pleased to partner with them again.

Encouraging Youth in Philanthropy is one of our prime objectives and it was pleasing to see our Youth Committee holding a Buderim Youth Meet Up in March. Students from local schools who attended were asked to consider options for youth engagement in the local area. We look forward to hearing about the initiatives that the group may propose.

We welcome the new owner of the Buderim Pharmacy (now Buderim ChemPro Chemist), Mehdi Bakhtiari, and are delighted that he and his wife, Mary Jalili, will continue the Pharmacy's sponsorship of the Foundation. A brief profile of Mehdi is included on p8.

Former owners Alistair and Santina Cook were Sponsors for 19 years and will remain involved with the Foundation. We thank them for their ongoing support.

We were saddened to learn of the passing of Ellen de Chastel in February. COMMUNITY GRANT SUCCESSES

Buderim Craft Cottage

The Buderim Craft Cottage is an integral part of the Buderim community. As well as being home to 13 vibrant art and craft groups with more than 300 members, the Cottage provides a permanent exhibition space (Atrium Gallery), specialised work spaces, meeting rooms, function spaces and facilities. Cottage members participate in Buderim's Easter and Christmas Fairs, hold regular exhibitions of members' work and run the biannual Winter School of Arts and Crafts.

The Craft Cottage received a Buderim Foundation Community Grant in 2023 to purchase a St. John's Ambulance G5 Automatic Defibrillator. Karen Doyle, the Cottage's Vice-President Property, said the model was chosen because of its ease of use and facility to "selftest" to maintain its readiness to operate. The defibrillator analyses a patient's heart rhythm, delivers a customised shock, and prompts the "rescuer" through the operation of the defibrillator and the administration of CPR. "Initial training has been given to members of all the art and craft groups using the Cottage, and that training will be repeated on an annual basis," Karen said.

With more than 25,000 people using or visiting the Cottage each year, with many from an older age group, it's reassuring for Cottage staff to have a quality, easy-to-use defibrillator in case of any cardiac incident.

Community Grants

Applications for the Foundation's 2024 Community Grants Program open on Monday 20 May and close on Monday 1 July. Eligible organisations serving the local Buderim area are invited to apply. Successful applicants will be announced at the Foundation's annual Community Grants Celebration on Sunday 15 September.

SCARS

SCARS (Sunshine Coast Animal Refuge Society), established in 1979, provides temporary refuge and finds new homes for abandoned, abused, stray or unwanted dogs and cats. SCARS received a Foundation Community Grant of \$10,000 in 2023 to assist with the purchase of a new van for rescuing and transporting animals. Together with help from others, SCARS managed to raise the funds needed to purchase the new van.

SCARS Patron Penny Brischke said that the van is a multi-purpose vehicle, transporting dogs and cats to veterinary clinics, taking dogs for out-of-refuge walks, collecting food donations and dropping off or collecting animals from foster carers or the Council Pound when required. The need for a reliable transport vehicle has become even more important recently with a three-fold increase in requests from the public to surrender pets. The Foundation was pleased to be able to support such a valuable service.

COMMUNITY GRANT SUCCESSES

LifeFlight Foundation

LifeFlight provides lifesaving medical treatment, emergency response and hospital airlifts to seriously ill or injured patients across Queensland, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Since 1979, LifeFlight has assisted more than 75,000 people and demand on the service continues to grow.

The local LifeFlight base at Sunshine Coast Airport received a Foundation Community Grant of \$4,645 in 2023 for new safety equipment to support its rescue helicopter crew. In March, some Buderim Foundation Board members visited the LifeFlight hangar for a demonstration of the helmet mounts for night vision goggles worn by the crew during after-dark missions. Pilot Brent explained how the mounts allowed an even weight distribution with the goggles across the front and back of the helmets. Even though it may seem a small addition, every piece of equipment that helps the crew operate more efficiently can save lives.

BACK TO SCHOOL VOUCHERS

The Foundation again supported local families with backto-school expenses by coordinating the distribution of vouchers, as part of the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR)'s Back to School Program.

This year, 570 vouchers, with a value of \$43,500, were distributed to Chancellor State College, Mountain Creek State School, Mountain Creek State High School and SunnyKids. The vouchers include 270 worth \$50 each to help families with expenses such as school uniforms, school or sports shoes and equipment, stationery and school supplies. A further 300 vouchers worth \$100 each were provided to help families with school-related technology expenses such as tablets and iPads, calculators, IT related items such as headphones, keyboards and mice, printers, portable drives or internet data for completion of schoolwork.

Since 2005, the Foundation has distributed 5,799 vouchers, with a total value of \$304,950. Unfortunately, this is the last year that FRRR is running the Back to School Program. Over the life of the Program, the Foundation has been supported by the BWMCA, Buderim Rotary and Lions Clubs in providing some matched funding.

Buderim Foundation Grants Committee Chair Linda Bolton said the grants were important not only because of the immediate assistance they provided, but for the positive ripple effects they had.

"The school chaplains who distribute these grants have told us over the years that these relatively small individual contributions often mean students and their families feel loved and cared for by the local community and also more confident and get more involved at school, which has educational and social benefits for them."

More than 65 Ambassadors and friends enjoyed an inspiring breakfast event with guest speaker Julian Burton OAM in April. A survivor of the 2002 Bali bombings, Julian shared his experiences of surviving and thriving in the aftermath of such a traumatic event. During his rehabilitation, Julian was struck by how fortunate he was, in terms of the support of doctors, nurses, family and friends, compared to others.

In 2003, he established the Julian Burton Burns Trust to provide burn management services and support for individuals affected by burns. The Trust raised over \$20 million for vital national programs during its 15 years of operation.

In 2018, Julian and his wife Kay established the Burton Foundation to continue their philanthropic work, focussing on community projects and causes in South Australia.

Julian spoke of philanthropy as being about people, purpose and partnerships, not profit. He acknowledged the strong moral values instilled in him by his parents. He also emphasised the importance of hard work, kindness, love, helping others and relationships as anchors for a meaningful life. As he said, giving breeds happiness.

Local Member Brent Mickelberg kindly donated a breakfast hamper as one of the raffle prizes for the morning, with Ambassador Graham Tamblyn being the lucky winner.

It was an inspirational start to the day.
